Pastor's Ponderings

'Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear.' Ephesians 4:29

We are beginning work with a Church Consultant for the purpose of developing a long range plan. It has been 13 years since this building was completed. At that time there were plans to build another section of this building with classrooms and a kitchen. The plan was to develop a weekday preschool downstairs. Those plans have never been realized but have continued to be a part of the church's conversation about our future.

Our Church Council approved hiring the Church Consultant upon recommendation of a small group called the 'Building Inspiration Team' who met three times in August and September. The goal of hiring the Church Consultant is to develop a long range plan and answer the question of whether we need, want and have the capacity to finish the building. Rev. Mary Scifers is an experienced church consultant and coach. She will be coming to meetings, running retreats and leading conversations to reflect the core values and passion of this congregation.

Entering into a time of long range planning for the discernment of our future ministry can bring out grief, anger, fear, anxiety, resentment and suspicion as well as hope, excitement, joy and renewed enthusiasm for our future. I've already heard every one of these from you. From the choir room to the narthex and out in the parking lot there is talk that goes on.

Paul writes to the people of Ephesus about how to be a church, and to live in community. Paul says in Ephesians 4:1-3, 'as a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.' As we enter into this focused time of discernment, I encourage you to take Paul's words to heart. Be patient with one another as you speak about our future, and the future of this church for people who aren't even born yet.

A long range plan should project out three to five to ten years. That means we will be planning for 2020 to 2022 and into 2027. I wonder who will be here and what will be the age of our congregation then? Will we have an active group of 30-somethings who are singing with the band and connected with our community partners? Who are we called to reach out to in 2027 that we don't even know today? The work we do now, is for our children and grandchildren and other people's children and grandchildren.

How do we stay current with everything, even as we seek to follow Jesus? The truth is if we are looking into the future, some things will change. Even when the way we do ministry changes and the people we see week to week change, the Savior we follow stays the same. God is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow. So let us take heart and be patient and kind to one another as we look into the future and for new ways to offer Christ love to our neighbors.

Building inspiration with a consultant alongside Welcoming Rev. Mary Scifres Into Our Process

Ministry and vision are flowing freely, your leadership team is enthusiastic about our dreams and plans for 2018 and beyond. God is on the move in Vista, CA! You are serving Christ's church generously and are making a huge impact with your loving service in our community and world. Thank you!

For the last year, your Church Council and Building Inspiration teams have been envisioning the church's future, brainstorming ministry dreams and goals in order to discern where God is leading us. They have been asking how the ministry you do and are called to do impact our building usage and potential needs for expanding our facility space. We know that leading and living into God's vision for the church takes a specific unified focus from leaders and members. As UMC of Vista looks to our future, we want to lead and live into that vision effectively and passionately with each and every one of you.

Late this summer, after a great deal of wonderful clarity about who we are and where we are going over the next year or two, your leadership team realized we would be encouraged by an outside perspective and additional guidance to guide us to a longer-term vision and plan. Under Pastor Leigh Ann's guidance and referrals from our District Superintendent John Farley, we investigated resources and church consultants who might be helpful. The Church Council has chosen Church Consultant Rev. Mary Scifres to work with our pastors, our staff, and our leaders to help us get to that longer-term clarity. Included in her work with us, Mary will lead us in a congregational discernment and decision-making process about whether and what to build in the spring, guided by the God-given vision we discern for our church and the ministry plans and goals to live out that vision.

Rev. Scifres notes that, "Most churches want to be vital and focused, but don't prioritize or actualize that dream. I am very inspired to work with your team, as your focus and passion for ministry is already so obvious." Rev. Scifres helps churches to spend adequate time in collaborative discernment to reach consensus, develop buy-in of the vision, affirmation to live into this vision and harness the passion of the people. During this focused process we hope to become more vital within and throughout our community. The goal is not merely growing membership, but growing our focused ministry, and trusting that God will sustain and grow our congregation.

What is Scrip?

I was asked this question again this week, so here goes.

Currently, SCRIP is the term used in the nonprofit world that refers to GIFT CARDS and GIFT CERTIFICATES issued by major merchants such as ARCO, Stater Brothers, Albertsons, Home Depot, Walmart, Lowes, Sprouts, Chevron, Target and Souplantation. (These happen to be some of our top sellers.)

The very same gift cards and gift certificates issued and accepted at merchant establishments are the same gift cards and gift certificates used in the Scrip Program here at our church at the SCRIP TABLE every Sunday. Scrip is issued by the merchants themselves, and can be, depending on the merchants, paper gift certificates or plastic gift cards. Also, depending on merchants, the Scrip gift cards and gift certificates may be able to be redeemed on the merchants' own website.

We buy the Scrip at a discount (1 1/2% to 15%) and sell at face value. The profit we make goes to help support the capital expenditures needed for the children and youth programs. In 2016, we earned over \$5,000.

The Scrip we sell can be used for your own personal use, or for gifts for weddings, birthdays, graduations, and/or Christmas, just to name a few.

We have regular weekly buyers, some occasional buyers, and many who never buy at all. Why not stop by the Scrip table in the narthex and pick up an inventory sheet. I'll bet there are items there you use weekly that you could purchase and help the YOUTH at the same time.

I hope to see you at the table soon. We need a few volunteer workers too.

It's Cold/Hot in the Sanctuary!

Our church has an HVAC system (Heating/Ventilation/Air Conditioning) that was designed for a much larger facility than we currently have. The plan, more than 15 years ago, was to build the rest of the facility within a few years, which would be cooled by our current HVAC configuration. The limits of our current system create uneven heating and cooling in the sanctuary, a large quantity of air coming out in a few places around the sanctuary room and spikes in power use that affect our energy cost. In addition, the aging process of the HVAC and the uneven stress on the system has caused a variety of repair needs that the Trustees have been managing. The Trustees are very aware of all concerns, complaints and hopes for a more even and regular temperature during your worship time. As this is a regular facility management issue of our congregation, it has been a part of our regular operating expenses budget. The issue of our HVAC system and how we manage it into the future would best be helped by our congregation deciding whether it's time to move forward with building a new building and additional ministries or deciding to retain our current configuration and get a new HVAC for the current building. For the meantime, we invite you to pray about our visioning into the future, and come to worship with a jacket to put on for those low temperatures that sometimes occur.
