Pastor's Ponderings

"For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation." Romans 5:10-11, NRSV

When I was a young person, learning about managing finances, I learned how to reconcile my bank account every month. I received a bank statement in the mail, which included my checks that had cleared. I sat down at the dining room table and began reviewing each check number and comparing it to the bank statement and my check book.

In relationships, reconciliation means restoring a friendly connection with someone. It also means finding compatibility between perspectives. At this moment in our national life, there are a lot of divisions and anger. In our denomination of the Christian faith, there is also a lot of division and disagreement. Over many topics, we are a divided and not a reconciled people. We struggle to find or name our common values, morals and beliefs.

In our Christian faith, we believe that Jesus' work in life and on the cross reconciled our human relationship with God. This is the meaning of the above passage from Paul's letter to the Romans. We believe that Jesus' teaching and love bridges a gap between our human failures and God's gracious compassion. One of Jesus many roles is the work of a mediator. Although humanity was created good at the beginning of creation, we struggle to care for one another and ourself.

The language of reconciliation has taken on a more specific justice issue over last decade. Reconciling ministries in our UM churches relates to lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, transgender and queer relationships. This group has worked in an effort to advocate for full inclusion and connection of LGBTQ persons. Since 1972, our UM rule book has said that "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching." Not since the issues of ordaining women or civil rights have we seen such vehement disagreement.

On February 5, 2023, our congregation held an adjourned charge conference after worship. You voted on three motions. You approved the outreach grant budget for our community partners initiative. You approved dissolving the building committee after the final certificate of occupancy is achieved. And you approved joining the Reconciling Ministries Network. Each of these is very significant, and is a profound ministry. Each one of these motions is a bold statement about who this congregation has been and how you are called to move forward in faith.

Although this congregation is not of one mind, more than 75% of the people who voted approved joining an organization which advocates for LGBTQ+ justice and full inclusion in the United Methodist Church. (You can find more information on Reconciling Ministries Network at www.rmnetwork.org) The members of this congregation who advocated for this vote have worked for years to lift this issue, invite those who disagree into conversation and listen to different perspectives with dignity.

The word and work of reconciliation has many meanings, but the most important to a Christian is the act of Jesus reconciling humanity with God. Jesus taught and sacrificed his life that humanity might know God's grace. This love that Jesus demonstrated was and is for all people, not just those with a particular view point. Jesus acted with love for the least, the last, and the lonely. Jesus called us to love our neighbor, no matter who our neighbor is. Although our congregation may have differing view points on human sexuality, I pray we can continue a common mission for service, witness, compassion and justice in our community and world.

May God continue to keep us in connection and conversation.

First of all, ASL goes beyond hand gestures alone – facial expressions and body language also play a critical role in communication. For example, use your eyebrows when asking a question. ASL beginners usually start with learning the alphabet. The 26 letters of the English alphabet can be conveyed through signs in ASL, and words can be spelled out through sequences of signs. March Lenten Project

Recently some 200 asylum migrants were bused into San Diego County, 69 of them to Oceanside, by Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Each entered the US seeking asylum, interviewed by DHS, and granted temporary admission as a reprieve from a threat to their lives, almost all with sponsor families waiting to receive them somewhere in the U.S.. They were transferred here through what is known as a “lateral move”, when normal government processing and release channels are beyond capacity. As a result the existing migrant shelters operating in San Diego County, run by Jewish Family Services and Catholic Charities, also ran out of capacity, sending them to Oceanside. Many were unaware of where they were, thinking they were still in Arizona. Each person was given strict reporting requirements and left to try to locate their sponsors for further travel.

When dropped off, many of the seekers had little more than what they were wearing on their backs and little to no warm clothing so were not prepared for storms. Additionally, many could not contact their sponsors for help as they were not allowed, by policy, to charge their phones at the Homeland Security Facility. Some of the seekers, also per policy, had been separated from their family, and with little to no English, had little idea of how to find them or how to get started on their journey forward.

There was great community response via several of our existing Community Partners. The seekers were housed and given the support needed to locate and transition to their sponsors who had housing waiting for them. Our Community Partners anticipate this situation reoccurring and as such have teamed together to form a Community Response Team. Everyone on the team is a volunteer and provide logistic, basic need and housing support as needed.

For Lent, to support the efforts of the Community Response team we have a list of needs available in the narthex along with a place to receive the items. Visa gift card purchases (\$25/\$50) can be left at the Scrip table. There is also a QR code on the <interfaithservices.org> web page if you wish to make a monetary donation. Thank you for your help with this important Lenten Mission Project.

Leap to Success is one of the first 25 nonprofits in the country to be part of an initiative by Stand Together Foundation to cultivate the country’s most innovative organizations to create lasting change.
