Pastor's Ponderings

We are soon to enter "The After." It is the time of the year after Easter. For many this is a boring, uneventful time of year. Although we are entering the time of the Christian year after Jesus' public ministry, his life, death and resurrection, this time of year is all about us.

The United Methodist Church of Vista has a vision for mission, outreach and service. The last year of finishing the building that was started 20 years ago has been about making space for community engagement. We still have work to do to develop staff and policy for this vision, but this church is closer to the vision we named 8 years ago than ever before.

During the end of April, in worship, pledge cards for service will be shared. These cards are similar to our end of year call to financial giving, except they are an invitation to service. Service is both inside and outside the walls of our church, and although there are many ministries listed, there are many more that could be. When you see the calls to pledge your service, we hope you will take some extra time to prayerfully consider where and how God is calling you to serve during "the after." Between Easter and Christmas 2023, what hours and effort will you give in faith?

Lent has been a time I've given up watching the news. I've listened to KPBS radio and read articles to keep current, but most days I've let the practice of news watching fall aside. My spirit feels both relieved and sad to give up this practice. I have always believed that staying current and mindful of national and global events both as an active member of civil society and a person of faith who prays is important. After Lent I will go back to more regular attention to current events, but I will do so with a deeper clarity about how much anxiety comes from this practice.

The gospel of Matthew, chapter 6: 25-27 teach, "therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?'

Lent reminds us that life is finite. Our days come and go. The time we have to make a difference in this world is limited. There is a meme I've read online that says, "if you can't do anything else, be kind." As we enter the time after Easter, this statement and the teaching of Matthew's gospel about worry are vital to our world and our faith. The good news of our faith is the powerful antidote to the bad news that surrounds us in this world.

The good news of Jesus' love and compassion shreds the bad news of hopelessness and despair. During late Spring and into Summer I encourage you to share good news with your prayers, your presence, your actions and your gifts. Carry the work of Lent forward into the rest of the year, and remember the rest of the year is for us to grow as faithful disciples of Jesus. Our faith happens unevenly. Some days we struggle and others we thrive in the light of God. How ever you find your faith, let each morning be a new beginning for you to listen for God's call in your heart.

God's calling is born from love for creation. May we each hear in our heart the tender calling to love as we have been loved and to forgive as we've been forgiven.

Story of Love...

As a Reconciling Ministries Community, we want to make sure that all feel welcomed in our church, especially those who are marginalized. Our RMC mission statement speaks not only of sexual orientation and gender identity, it also includes race, age, ethnicity, physical or mental capacity, education, economic or marital status. We want to make sure that ALL know they are all of God's family, that ALL are encouraged to become involved in the life and ministry of our church, that ALL have a seat at the grown-ups table, and no one is left out.

For several years a friend attended another church in the denomination where she was raised. The pastor knew that she was gay, and told her every time he saw her that he was praying for her. She was pretty certain that he was praying that God would "save" her from the sin of homosexuality, as he understood it. He was very sincere in his beliefs, and his prayers were no doubt equally as sincere. What my friend needed then, what she needs now, is a church that will pray WITH her, walk WITH her. What marginalized persons need is a church home that will pray WITH them, walk WITH them. That's a big part of what we want UMCV to be.

Why does this matter? Why does it matter how welcoming we are? It matters to the single parent who is working hard to raise their child. It matters to the millenial (22-35 yrs old) who wants to find meaning for their life. It matters to the parent of a trans child who wants desperately to provide healthy spiritual guidance along with love and nurturing. It matters to the person who lives with a disability and needs barriers removed. It matters to the couple who fall in love and need a church family to embrace them and support them. It matters to the couple who have taken in their aging parents. It matters to the person who was kicked out of their church when they came out as LGBTQ, or whose marriage ended in divorce, or who was an alcoholic or drug addict and who all heard words as they were growing up that who they were was an abomination in God's eyes, and have never darkened a church door since, afraid that God really doesn't love them. It matters to the parents who have been told that their child's sexual orientation damns them to hell, and that it is the parent's fault. It matters to all who have been excluded and need desperately to know that they are beloved by the God who created them, and by those who claim the name Christian.

Becoming a reconciling church is a big step towards meeting Jesus' command, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. You shall love your neighbor as yourself." God continue to move us forward in faith.
