### **Pastor's Ponderings**

Hello September!

I love September. It reminds me of going back to school, fresh starts and the cooling off from summer. It doesn't have any particular holiday that causes any stress. Fall has been my favorite season since I was a child.

At the entry way of fall, there are a few things we start to look forward to at church. Visioning our ministry for the rest of the year. Looking toward the following year. The long year end paperwork and then Advent. There is a lot to get through on the way to the "singingest" season of the year.

In addition to preparing for the end of the year, September is a month for preparation at your home. In Southern California we often see dangerous wildfires. We've just seen devastating fires in Maui and a summer of extreme heat. There is good reason to take a few hours and review your plans and supplies.

There are three areas I think of to prepare at home: evacuation list/plan, emergency kit and food/water resources.

Evacuation list and plan includes what I need to take with me. What and where is my essential paperwork including personal identification, and insurance documents? Do I have a medication list or supply for a few days to a week that I can easily access and pack? Where did I last store my cats' carriers? Don't forget those electric cords for charging phones or other electronic devices that keep you connected. Who will I notify if I have to evacuate and where will I go? These are my basics for evacuation.

My emergency kit is from the store and has basic bandages and a bottle of Tylenol. I have a fire extinguisher in my garage. There are at least 6 flashlights around my home space since I'm not always great at checking batteries. We have a basic kit and many fire extinguishers around the church too. I still have some N95 masks that will be useful if there is a fire and an extra pair of glasses.

If the electricity goes out I have resources to last about three days in water and food. That is what the online planning suggests. I used to have camping food when I went camping, but those days are gone and so is that resource. Planning ahead includes checking expiration dates and knowing what you do and do not have at home.

Lastly, consider your own spiritual and physical comfort needs. In times of stress, disaster, and loss, taking care of your own well-being should not be an after thought. Your favorite blanket, a special picture, or a coffee mug that you use every morning are essential too. Don't leave your family Bible or special book behind or forget how much a small treasure can ease your heart. It may seem obvious, but stay rested and hydrated.

Fall is a time of looking at the rest of the year and getting ready. Fall is a time of starting again. Jesus says, "Let not your heart be troubled and do not be afraid." He spoke encouragement regularly to disciples who were facing plenty of challenge and a world that was unjust and temperamental. As we get a few things in order, we do it knowing that Jesus is with us through every event of our lives. Take good care as we shift to the end of the year.

# **Introducing New Covenant Missionaries**

From Vista to the Mexico/U.S. border, it is only 45 miles, according to Google Maps.

Since my arrival at UMC Vista 25 years ago, the church has supported Methodist churches in the Tijuana area with funds and service to repair buildings and provide necessities to the people. During the last couple years, we have made personal hygiene kits and had them delivered across the border by Rev. Hortiales, Director of Hispanic/Latino Ministry and Border Concerns in the Cal-Pac Annual Conference.

Dr. Rev. Joel Hortiales is now one of our Covenant Missionaries. (In last month's Flame there was an explanation of the Covenant Relationship between a congregation and a missionary.) Much of Rev. Hortiales experience and training points toward mission service. He was born in Mexico City and began Biblical and evangelism studies at Cliff College of Sheffield University and studied theology at Westminister College, Oxford, in England. He earned a MA degree from Claremont School of Theology in 2010, and in 2018 the Doctor of Ministry from Fuller Seminary. In 1998, he was ordained as an elder in the Methodist Church of Mexico and became an elder in the Cal-Pac Conference of the United Methodist Church in 2011. His work experience includes serving churches in Mexico and the Cal-Pac Conference.

On the Global Ministries website he is quoted as saying, "I'm sure that God has called me to build his kingdom with the mind of a missional leader." By being supportive of Rev. Hortiales's work we are answering the call to help build God's Kingdom.

Now travel in your mind to a completely different part of the world to meet another dedicated missionary.

Deaconess Joy Prim serves as a welfare case officer for migrant domestic workers. She received her training and experience as a mission intern with Mission for Migrant Workers (MFMW). Deaconess Prim worked in the Los Angeles and the San Francisco areas providing direct services and advocacy for Filipino migrant workers, before her present assignment in Hong Kong. In Hong Kong, she works with the MFMW who operate a walk-in center for migrant domestic workers who have experienced issues with abusive work issues. They also partner with a shelter organization, Bethune House Migrant Women's Refuge.

Much of her work is coordinating community outreach programs and work and life skills training sessions. As a missionary, Joy provides stability and continuity to the mission's social justice work. I recently received her latest newsletter and I would gladly forward your email address to her so more of us will learn about her work through the newsletter. Joy grew up in North Carolina where her faith journey was nurtured by her mother and grandmother, who were members of United Methodist Women. The foundation they laid for caring about issues of women, children and youth sparked her yearning for mission work. As a member of the California Pacific Conference, she was welcomed into the order of Deaconess and Home Missioner in 2020, and consecrated as a deaconess in May 2022.

#### "and Two Fishes" Update

This last year has been filled with many challenges, changes, and partnerships for "and Two Fishes."

We are so grateful and excited to finally be in our new commercial kitchen as of March. This new expanded area, which includes a state-of-the-art kitchen, a new social hall, multiple storage areas, bathrooms with a single shower, an area for Helping Hands outreach and other needed storage.

The new kitchen comes with additional requirements for each of our volunteers who come in contact with the food. They each had to study and take a Food Handlers Test in order to work in the kitchen. May we just say that we have the most knowledgeable, hard-working, and dedicated volunteers that anyone could ask for, and we thank God for each one of you.

We have recently partnered with T-Mobile and Humanity Showers. T Mobile has made it possible to get our clients a free cell phone, and Humanity Showers are now available on Thursdays between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m.

We have joined with North County Food Bank to establish membership for both us and our clients. This can open up the food bank for our clients to get food directly from them. This gives "and Two Fishes" the opportunity to expand our menu and save money.

Over this past year, we have gone from providing approximately 15-20 meals per week, on Thursdays, to upwards of 35-40 or more, each week. The word is definitely spreading about our new facility, and we are seeing new people almost every week.

We extend God's love to those in need, with the hope that it will lessen their anxieties and worries for a little while. Our beautiful new social hall offers a place of solitude, camaraderie, and a chance to renew one's spirit.

Many thanks to all of our volunteers who have offered their help in countless ways, and without whom, an outreach of this size and scope would not be possible.

Our church has worked for over 20 years to provide this community outreach for people that are in need. I can tell you that the people that are enjoying this wonderful outreach are truly appreciative.
